Eliminate violence against women and girls & sustain respect for women's bodily integrity and autonomy; 2. Protect full economic rights and justice for women; 3. Expand democratic space; sustain inclusive governance and equal political participation of women.

*Location: Africa and Asia (Iraq, Jordan, Lebanon, Palestine, Yemen, Iran and Syria). Eligibility: Women-led and women's rights groups and organisations registered in the above countries, excluding Sudan, South Sudan, Iran and Syria. Grant size: US\$20,000 to US\$ 500,000 over 1 year Closing date: 17 June


<u>The US Department of State's Bureau of Near Eastern Affairs Office of Assistance</u> <u>Coordination</u>

*Type of project: strengthening women's contribution to the formal and informal economies, including how they are recruited, retained, and promoted in the formal sector and what role they play in the informal economy

*Location: the Middle East and North Africa region

*Eligibility: US or foreign non-profit organizations may apply. Applicants are strongly encouraged to submit projects that include partnerships with local organisations that would work together on specific programmatic objectives or priorities and that utilise local expertise

Grant size: up to \$6,000,000 Closing date: 20 June



1. University of Cape Town



Leading the way for the top universities in Africa is South Africa's oldest university, the **University of Cape Town**, ranked joint 200th in the QS World University Rankings® 2019 along with Sweden's Stockholm University. The campus sits upon the slopes of Table Mountain's Devil's Peak, offering fantastic views.

2. University of the Witwatersrand



Ranked joint 381st this year, the **University of the Witwatersrand** (often called Wits for short) is another South African institution, with five campuses in urban and suburban Johannesburg, the country's largest city. The university has around 38,350 students, of which about 3,750 are international students.

3. Stellenbosch University



Stellenbosch University is placed joint 405th in the world and within the top 50 of the BRICS ranking. Founded in 1918, the university is located in the town of Stellenbosch, 50 kilometers east of Cape Town.

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University in Cairo is ranked joint 420th in the world in 2019. Also ranked sixth in the most recent edition of the Arab region university rankings, it teaches in English and possesses Egypt's largest English-language library collection.

5. Cairo University



Egypt's **Cairo University** is ranked in the 521-530 range of the overall world rankings, and 11th in the Arab regional ranking. Despite the name, its main campus is actually in Giza, 20km southwest across the Nile from Cairo.

6. University of Johannesburg



Up from 601-650 to 551-560 this year, the **University of Johannesburg** is the youngest university in South Africa to feature in the QS World University Rankings, having been formed from a merger of earlier institutions as recently as 2005.

7. University of Pretoria



Ranked 561-570 in the world this year is South Africa's **University of Pretoria**. It's one of the largest universities in the country, with over 50,000 students at seven campuses. Established in 1908, the university also features in the top 50 of the latest QS BRICS University Rankings.

8. Ain Shams University



The first of the best universities in Africa to be ranked 701-750 is the Egyptian **Ain Shams University**, which is ranked 17th in the QS Arab Region University Rankings 2018. Based in Cairo and established in 1950, Ain Shams is a very large institution, hosting approximately 180,000 students in 15 faculties.

9. University of Kwazulu-Natal



The South African **University of Kwazulu-Natal** is ranked 751-800 in the world this year and is another young university formed through a merger, this time in 2004. The university has five campuses around the KwaZulu-Natal province in the south east of the country.

=10. Assiut University



New to this year's ranking, Egypt's **Assiut University** was established in 1957 as the first university in Upper Egypt, and is located in an urban campus in the large city of Asyut. It offers courses both English and Arabic-taught courses.

- In those two countries, 80% of Research funding at the Universities are from the Governments
- 15% of funds for Research come from Income Generation Activities
- Only 5% of funds for research are from external grants

Income Generation Activities among Academic Staffs at Malaysian Public Universities

Conclusion

- Cameroon Universities have a long way to go in term of research capacity development.
- External funding alone may not be sufficient to fill the existing gap
- A programme for massive public fund investment into Cameroon Universities is badly needed
- University academic Staff need trust and confidence to carry out Income generation activities to complement the government funds
